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# About the Boulder County Domestic Abuse Prevention Project

Since 1986, the Domestic Abuse Prevention Project (DAPP) has worked to improve the response to domestic violence in Boulder County. By treating domestic violence as a crime, we strive to raise awareness of the issues to prevent further abuse. The Project is a coordinated effort among law enforcement, the District Attorney's Office, the Judiciary, Community Justice Services, Probation, Social Services, battered women's shelters, perpetrator treatment providers and concerned individuals. DAPP acts as a liaison to all involved agencies, monitors the effectiveness of system-wide efforts, and maintains statistics on all reported cases of domestic violence in Boulder County.

Goals of the Project are to:

- Reduce the number of deaths and injuries from domestic violence;
- Increase interdepartmental communication;
- Improve interagency coordination;
- · Raise community awareness of intimate partner violence and alternatives to violence; and
- Work with agencies and others to ensure that victims of domestic violence are provided the best possible services.

# DAPP's Statistical Methodology

DAPP maintains an electronic database containing over 16,000 domestic violence related incidents from 1994 to the present. Initially, DAPP receives domestic violence reports (verbal and arrest) from Boulder County Law Enforcement Agencies. From these reports, the Research Analyst and interns collect information about the incident information. Next, DAPP collects information about the defendant's demographics from the Tiburon computer system and the defendant's bond information from the Bond Commissioner's bond sheets and the state court computer ICON. Finally, DAPP collects information about sentencing from the DA's computer system CaseTrak and ICON. This information is stored in a county supported database; the information reported in this report is not exhaustive to the data that DAPP collects. # Statistical Summary and Highlights, January-June 2003

- All Case Summary:
  - For the first half of 2003, overall Boulder County experienced a 3% increase from the first half of last year in reported domestic violence cases.
  - Longmont is reporting **42%** of the formal domestic violence cases (arrest, book and release, summons, and warrant arrest) for Boulder County.
  - 15 more double arrests occurred this year compared to the same period last year.

### Felonies and Misdemeanors:

• The rate of felony arrests dropped significantly. For the past three years, the ratio of felony arrests and misdemeanor arrests has fluctuated by one percent each year, staying around 22% for felony arrests and 78% for misdemeanor arrests; however, for the first half of this year, the ratio is 18% for felony arrest and 82% for misdemeanor arrests.

### Demographics:

- For the first half of 2003, the female arrest rate was at 21%.
- For the first half of 2003, the recidivism rate was 31%.
- The majority of defendants and victims are in the age range of 18-29.
- The majority of defendants has at least a high school diploma and is employed.

### Incident Information:

• In over one third of the cases, the defendant and victim are no longer involved in a relationship at the time of the incident.

• In approximately a third of the cases, defendants used alcohol and/or an illegal substance; in approximately one sixth of the cases, victims used alcohol and/or an illegal substance. In 11% of the cases, both defendants and victims used alcohol and/or an illegal substance.

• In less than half of the cases, law enforcement reported documented offering victim advocate services (by either calling, presenting a brochure, etc.). However, this statistic should be interpreted with caution because this information comes directly from the police reports and does not document if the victim was offered services through follow up contact.

• In a small portion of the cases, the defendant used a weapon (DAPP defines a weapon as something other than a part of the body used to threaten or harm the victim) and in the majority of those cases, defendants used something other than a knife or firearm (telephones, bottles, keys, rocks, baseball bats, etc.).

#### Children Who Witness:

• In a quarter of the formal cases there was at least one child present during the domestic violence incident. Of those cases, three quarters of the children either heard or saw the incident.

- In over half of the formal cases where children were present during the time of the incident, the defendant was charged with child abuse.
- Only 5% of the children that were present during the incident were not a child of either the defendant or victim.

## Recidivism and Multiple Victimizations

• Both domestic violence recidivism rates and multiple victimization rates in Boulder County were 31%. Please note that since DAPP's conversion to their new database, recidivism and repeat victimization is no longer tracked from 1986, but now is tracked from 1994. By 2004, DAPP expects to have domestic violence information from 1986 to 1993 electronically converted. DAPP's definition of recidivism and repeat victimizations only includes domestic violence crimes committed in Boulder County.

## Bonds:

• For the first half of 2003, 15% of the defendants did not post bond prior to the disposition of their case. Of those defendants who posted bonds, 71% of the defendants were held until the two o'clock hearings before posting bond. 2% or 9 defendants had no conditions attached to their bonds.

## Disposition Information:

• There were a total of 744 cases that had disposition dates with the January to June period. Of those, **33%** (246) domestic violence cases came through Longmont County Court.

• There were two defendants that were sentenced to deferred prosecutions.<sup>1</sup>

• Only 77% of convicted first time offenders were sentenced to domestic violence treatment.

• Only 4% of sentenced cases, where children were present and the defendant charged with child abuse resulted in a conviction for child abuse.

## • 15 Year Overview:

• There was no percentage increase in domestic violence formal cases from the last half of 2002 to the first half of 2003.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Colorado Statute (18-6-801 (4)) states: no person accused or convicted of a crime, the underlying factual basis of which has been found by the court on the record to include an act of domestic violence, as defined in section 18-6-800.3 (1), shall be eligible for home detention in the home of the victim pursuant to section 18-1.3-105 or 18-1.3-106 or for **deferred prosecution** pursuant to section 18-1.3-101. Nothing in this subsection (4) is intended to prohibit a court from ordering a deferred sentence for a person accused or convicted of a crime, the underlying factual basis of which has been found by the court on the record to include an act of domestic violence, as defined in section 18-6-800.3 (1).

#### Information about First Time Offenders and Recidivists in Domestic Violence Offenses in Boulder County

For the first half of 2003, of the 676 formal arrests **467** (**69%**) were first time offenders and **209** (**31%**) were recidivists or had committed a previous domestic violence crime in Boulder County. Of the those recidivists, **126** (**60%**) of the defendants committed their second domestic violence offense and **83** (**40%**) of defendants committed their third or more domestic violence offense.

Recidivism is based on information collected by the Domestic Abuse Prevention Project since 1994, when electronic data collection began. DAPP recidivist statistics include both technical violations (e.g., violation of restraining order, bond conditions, etc.) and "new" incidents.

\*\*While some recidivists may have many years between offenses, some reoffend on the same day as their initial arrest. This feat may be accomplished, for example, by telephoning the victim from the jail - in violation of bond conditions, temporary protective order, or both.

#### Information about First Time Victims and Victims in Prior Domestic Violence Offenses in Boulder County

For the first half of 2003, of the 676 formal arrests **467** (**69%**) were first time victims and **209** (**31%**) were prior victims of a domestic violence crime in Boulder County. Of those prior victims, **122** (**58%**) of the victims were victims of a second domestic violence offense and **88** (**42%**) of victims were victims of their third or more domestic violence offense.

## *Bond Information* January - June 2003

In the first half of 2003, there were **668** defendants eligible for bond (full custody arrests and warrant arrest). Of those, **588** (**85%**) defendants posted bond and **80** (**15%**) defendants did not post bond.

In the first half of 2003, **420** (288 first time offenders and 132 recidivists) or **71%** of the defendants that posted bond were held until the two o'clock bond hearings and **168** (142 first time offenders and 26 recidivists) or **29%** of the defendants that posted bond were not held until the two bond hearings.


