Eldorado Canyon to Walker Ranch Connection Feasibility Study Online Questionnaire Summary of Responses

Background

The public was encouraged to complete an online questionnaire to submit feedback on a preliminary agency recommendation for a preferred alternative regarding a multi-use trail connection between Eldorado Canyon and Walker Ranch.


On Nov. 21 the project partners published the Eldorado Canyon to Walker Ranch Trail Feasibility Study and a preliminary partner recommendation on the <u>project webpage</u> for community review. The three partner agencies are jointly recommending the North Route (using segments N1-N2-N4) as the preferred alignment for an Eldorado Canyon to Walker Ranch multi-use trail connection. Public comments on the study and preliminary recommendation received through Dec. 9, 2018, will be considered by the partner agencies in developing a final recommendation.

The online questionnaire began by asking the respondent to rate their level of support for the partner agency recommendation on a scale from very supportive to not at all. Using question skip logic, respondents were then directed to the correct sequence of follow-up questions based on the indicated level of support. The respondent was asked to select from a list of reasons why they support, are neutral to, or do not support the partner agency recommendation. Each question included an openended "other" answer option and a larger comment box for any additional comments the respondent would like to include about why. These comment boxes allowed a respondent to describe in their own words reasons not included in the list. Lastly, all respondents were asked a few demographic questions including where they live, how old they are, their gender, and the activities they choose while recreating on open space and public parks.

There were 671 unique respondents and 590 completed questionnaires. These results are considered feedback and not a statistically valid sample generalizable to the larger population.


The online questionnaire closed on Sunday, Dec. 9, 2018. Input received will help the partner agencies confirm or refine the agency-preferred alternative to be considered by the City of Boulder, Boulder County, and Colorado Parks and Wildlife decision makers.

The proposed area is a home and movement corridor for breeding birds, migratory birds, raptors, small mammals, large mammals, ungulates, reptiles, and even amphibians. The construction of a trail through this area would have a severe impact on this wildlife and potentially increase the frequency of human-wildlife conflict. Additionally, the trail's connection with Rattlesnake Gulch resides in a location that is in the nesting territory of our local golden eagles. Golden eagles are notoriously sensitive to disturbance and will abandon their nest if the proper management plans are not implemented and enforced. Even with seasonal closures in place, I have little faith that every single person will obey them. Similarly, I have deeply rooted concerns regarding the north route. The trail work involved and presence of bikes would no doubt disturb all of the wildlife mentioned above, including a pair of Cooper's Hawks that nest in the vicinity. I am a resident of Eldorado Springs and I see the problems of traffic congestion and overcrowding in the park every day in the summer, and I cannot even imagine that these agencies would willingly exacerbate the problem by going through with this trail project. A shuttle service is not going to work with bikes the way it works at Hessie with hikers, because it is a huge hassle to load bikes on a van, and bikers are very unlikely to use this option. Widening the parking lots at Dowdy Draw and the Mesa trailhead would be an eyesore, and that still means that bikes would be riding up the very narrow canyon road along with cars, which is not safe. 



Q12 What is your age range?






Q14 Which activities do you typically participate in when you visit open space or a state park?(select all that apply)
