
applause.

I retired in 2015 after 30 years with Boulder County, where I worked in the Architect's office, most recently as the Building Services Manager.



Visit CU Boulder's unique campus



Take a leisurely stroll through the University of Colorado's Boulder campus. Designed by Architect Charles Klauder and then CU President George Norlin (1917-1939) in the Tuscan Vernacular style, the campus is considered one of the most beautiful in the world.

During your walk, visit the school's first building, Old Main, completed on April 18, 1876, a few months before Colorado became a state. At the time, the building contained classrooms, library, science labs, and living quarters for the president, the caretaker and their families.

"The university is not the campus, not the buildings on the campus, not the faculties, not the students of any one time — not one of these or all of them. The university consists of all who come into and go forth from her halls, who are touched by her influence and who carry on her spirit . . ."

Preserving the pristine beauty of Boulder County



Boulder County purchased the final 66-acre parcel of the Loukonen Dairy Farm for \$1.65 million. This <u>acquisition</u> completes an agreement initiated in 2010 for 606 acres of pristine wildlife habitat and agricultural land located along the North Foothills Highway (U.S. 36) north of Boulder and south of St. Vrain Road--a prime residential development area.

"Without the full acquisition of this property, the visual and wildlife benefits of this critical landscape would have been radically changed for future generations," said Parks & Open Space Director Eric Lane.

Longs Peak Hospital opened two years ago, first as a Welcoming Ambassador and now on the medical/surgical/ICU wing, visiting patients and supporting the medical staff.

Volunteer Naturalist training begins Jan. 14

Parks & O(pen Space is accepting applications for the 2020 Volunteer Naturalist training class. Volunteer naturalists lead hikes, present slide programs, and provide hands-on experiences to people of all ages. Staff is especially looking for people interested in working with school groups, both on trails and in the class room. Topics range from wildlife and plants to ecology and geology.

Volunteer naturalists must be at least 18 years old, pass a background check and an interview, and participate in the 10-week training class. Applicants must also have ongoing weekday availability and commit to leading at least six programs in 2020.
